This comprehensive course is designed to equip practice nurses in primary care settings in the UK with the necessary skills and knowledge to assess and manage contraceptive services effectively. The course will focus on evidence-based practices, adherence to national guidelines, and an overview of the different contraceptive methods including oral contraceptives and injectable contraceptives and when they are indicated. Participants will also gain a thorough understanding of alternative contraception methods, emergency contraception choices and knowledge of sexually transmitted infections (STIs). Exploring health promotion, patient centred care and legal issues, participants will develop expertise in conducting contraception consultations, history taking, and comprehensive assessments. This will enable them to guide patients in making informed decisions about contraceptive choices, considering individual preferences and cultural and social needs. Through practical case studies and discussions on challenging scenarios, participants will refine their skills, ensuring they are well-prepared to address barriers to accessing contraception and uphold confidentiality, consent, and safeguarding principles in their practice. Developed in line with UK National Standards and Guidelines (including those in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland) and guidance from the NHS, NICE, the Faculty of Reproductive and Sexual Health (FRSH), UK Medical eligibility criteria for contraceptive use (UKMEC) and the Family Planning Association. Upon successful completion of the course, participants earn a certificate in Contraception for Practice Nurses, providing a pathway to gain clinical competence and practice under supervision through hands-on experience and mentorship in practice.
